1964/1965 SEASON GAME OUTCOMES and DETAILS

ONE - U-Mass - Academy Field

The Bears dropped their season opening match 1-2 to U-Mass - one of the toughest teams on the schedule. This disappointing loss followed a win for the cadets over U-Mass last year 2-1.

U-Mass scored in the first period with Co-Captain Marty Hoppe evening the count in the second period. The Bears outshot the visitors by a two to one margin in the second half but couldn't score. Jim Morgan, playing his first full varsity game in the nets, had 20 saves.

Hoppe, who set a new Academy scoring record with 17 goals in the 63/64 campaign has been looking most impressive in the early drills. And he's been getting lots of help up front from Gerry McGill and Bill Carr. The trio has played together for four seasons and are thoroughly familiar with one another's moves.

The three halfbacks of last year – Co Captain Bob Walker, Curt Knight and Gene Bowen – also are intact and this gives the Bears a good second line.

TWO - Clark University - Worcester, MA - Academy Field

Coast Guard Academy's soccer team had an easy time of things yesterday in whipping Clark University 6-0. The Bears scored in every period. Gerry McGill booted home three of the goals, Marty Hoppe added two and Drew Hamlin added the other. One goal was scored in the first period, two in the second, one in the third and two in the fourth.

THREE - New York Maritime – Bronx, NY - Reinhart Field

The Bears blitzed Maritime 6-0 led by Marty Hoppe with five scores added to his previous three for the season so far. He scored 17 goals a year ago to set a new Academy record and it appears he is well on his way to bettering that mark.

Gerry McGill, who has become a pretty fair scorer himself all of a sudden, tallied the sixth goal. He had scored three in the Clark game last week.

Especially pleasing to Coach Bechtel is that, after three games, the defensive unit has given up just two goals - back in their first game. Coach Bechtel singled out Co-Captain Bob Walker, Michael (Howie) Hoppe (younger brother of Marty Hoppe), Gene Bowen, Curt Knight and John Shokor for their defensive performance.

FOUR - Wesleyan - Academy Field

Wesleyan scored two first period goals, then held off a determined Bear attack for the final three periods to post a 2-1 victory. All of the scoring took place in the first quarter. The cadets couldn't score again although they dominated the action, attacking the Wesleyan goal time and time again. Although outplayed by the host Bears, Wesleyan held off sustained attacks to maintain their margin of victory. The Bears out played and out-shot Wesleyan taking 32 shots to their 18.

Hoppe twice booted the ball over the crossbar with an open goal in sight but did tally for his ninth goal of the season in four games. That gives him a good shot at breaking the 17 goal mark he set last year.

FIVE – W.P.I. - Wooster Poly-Tech - Academy Field

The Bears rallied from a first period deficit that Worcester dominated to defeat Worcester 3-2.

The lone Bear goal in the first period was tallied by Bill Carr. Gerry McGill knotted the count at 2-all in the second period and Curt Knight shot a goal in the third 22 minutes of play with neither team scoring in the fourth.

SIX – Middlebury, Vermont - South Street Field

The Bears lost 3-0 to a strong Middlebury team listed as one of the top soccer teams in New England. This was the first blanking of the season.

The Bears had a hard time getting moving and consequently could score no goals. One of Middlebury's goals came as a misjudged high bouncing ball went in.

The other two games lost by the cadets were by a 2-1 margin.

SEVEN – U. Rhode Island, RI - Meade Stadium

The Bears pushed its record for the season over the .500 mark by defeating University of Rhode Island 2-1. Ahead for them are three strong foes – University of Connecticut, Trinity and West Chester State.

Marty Hoppe's tenth goal of the season was the deciding factor in the Bear's win. Gerry McGill scored the first goal in the third period.

EIGHT – U-Conn - Academy Field

The Bears had to come from behind to beat this U-Conn team despite the fact they controlled play most of the time. They had many opportunities in the first half yet trailed 1-0.

Marty Hoppe squared accounts in the fourth period with his 11th goal of the season. Then after four minutes of the second overtime, Gerry McGill won the game with a penalty shot for the 2-1 win.

NINE – Trinity - Academy Field

Marty Hoppe scored a quick goal in the first 20 seconds of play with Trinity but the Bears lost 4-2 in overtime. The clippings did not identify who scored the second goal but other sources affirm the second goal was also from Hoppe.

TEN - West Chester State, West Chester, PA - Memorial Field

This crack soccer team was rated in the first ten nationally – one of the nation's powerhouses among small college squads.

Drew Hamblin scored the lone goal for the Bears in the second period. West Chester scored a goal in the first period, added two in the second and scored its final goal in the fourth period to win 4-1.

This ended the regular season play for the Bears with a 5-5 record. Adding the split win and loss of the two practice games before the beginning of the official season, the unofficial record at this point was 6-6.
