## CGA Soccer Team Accepts Tourney Bid

Coast Guard Academy's soccer team has accepted an invitation to play in the NCAA Middle Atlantic Regional soccer tournament at Tufts University next Friday and Saturday.

The Cadets will be the at-large team in the event.

Norwich University of Northfield, Vt., will represent District 1, (New England); Long Island University will represent District 2, and Washington and Lee University District 3.

For the Cadets, it will be the first soccer tournament invitation, and adds another sport to the list of academy participation in post-season events.

Two years ago, the baseball team was invited to the NCAA regional tourney at Hampden-Sydney. Last December, the unbeaten-untied football team played in the Tangerine Bowl.

Cadet wrestlers for years have taken part in the NCAA national tourney and the sailing

team has entered, and won, the Timme Angsten trophy on Lake Michigan five times. The sailors also have twice won the national championship in the past five years.

A year ago, the Cadet booters had their first winning season in academy history as they posted a 7-6 season. This year, they are 5-4 with one game left at 2 p.m. tomorrow against West Chester State College in West Chester, Pa. West

Chester is the alma mater of Linwood G. Bechtel, Cadet coach for the past two years.

Although the Cadet 5-4 record is not as imposing as a tourney mark might be, the fact is the team has played a rugged schedule and has lost three decisions by a total of four goals. Two of the losses were in overtime.

The Cadets left at 11 a.m. today for West Chester. They will return tonight and begin practice for the tourney Monday.

## Cadet Booters to Face Met District Champions

Coast Guard Academy's soccer team will play the Metropolitan champions — Long Island University — in one of two games scheduled Friday in the NCAA Middle Atlantic Regional tournament at Tufts University in Medford, Mass.

The Cadets and LIU will open tourney play Friday afternoon, while Norwich University of Northfield, Vt., and Washington and Lee University will meet in the second game.

The two winners will meet Saturday afternoon for the tourney title, while the losers are scheduled to play a consolation game for third place.

LIU brings a 9-3-1 record into the competition and seven of the nine wins have been by shut-outs. The Blackbirds have outscored the opposition 28-18 in goals.

LIU clinched the Metropolitan championship last Saturday by

defeating Queens, finishing the league with a 6-0-1 record.

One of the three losses for LIU was at the hands of powerful University of Bridgeport, while Wagner and Fairleigh-Dickinson were the other Blackbird conquerors.

While Coast Guard takes only a 5-5 record into the week end competition, the Cadets have faced much stiffer competition. Their losses were to University of Massachusetts, Trinity, Wesleyan, Middlebury and West Chester State. Only UMass has not been considered for post-season competition.

The week is a busy one for Coast Guard Coach Linwood G. Bechtel, who is dividing his time with the soccer and basketball squads. He works with the booters until dark, then comes inside to take over the hoopsters, who start their drills under Lt. Robert DeMichiell, freshmen coach.

# Tufts Host for NCAA Soccer Tourney

Long Island University, Division II representative in the NCAA College Division Soccer Tournament to be held at Tufts on Friday and Saturday, has been declared ineligible.

Harry Arlanson, tournament director, announced today that Fairleigh-Dickinson University of Rutherford, N. J., (8-3-1) would be the replacement.

Long Island was disqualified when it was learned the team had taken part in a university division last year.

According to NCAA rules, a team must wait at least one year before it may return to college division competition.

The four-team showdown will bring together the finest small college soccer teams along the Eastern seaboard from Maine to Florida.

The other three teams are Norwich University of Northfield, Vt., District I selection with a 7-1-0 record; Washington and Lee University of Lexington, Va., District III leader with an 8-2-1 mark; and U. S. Coast Guard Academy of New London, Conn., the at-large pick with a 5-5-0 record.

## STAR BOOTER

Norwich brings to Medford a unique team. It is one of the rare few without foreign

students on its roster. With 31 American-born players—the largest turnout in Norwich's six-year history—Coach Harvey Lyford has put together a team that has scored 22 goals while allowing only four in eight games.

The Cadets' lone loss came at the hands of Middlebury, 3-2. Stars among Norwich's cast are All-America candidate, full-back-halfback Billy O'Neil, goalie Joel Kobert and forward Marty Wilkes the top scorer with five goals and five assists.

On paper, Coast Guard Academy's record (5-5-0) is the least impressive of the lot. But Coach Linwood Bechtel's booters have played a rugged schedule and rated an at-large berth on the basis of a high Saylor System ranking. Three of their losses came in overtime.

Marty Hoppe, co-captain and center forward, has 15 goals this season after establishing an Academy record of 17 goals last fall. His personal high for one game is five. Also starring for the Cadets is Bob Walker, halfback who has a flock of major league baseball scouts on his trail.

Washington and Lee will flash three outstanding backs, including junior Tim Henry who has 11 goals and nine assists. Henry has been an All-State selection since his freshman year. The Virginians also have the state's outstanding defensive soccer player in Dave Redmond, a sturdy senior fullback.

Washington and Lee University defeated Norwich, 2—0, in the other semi-final.

Hoppe's scoring spree sparked a Coast Guard team that had been an at-large entry after an unimpressive season record of five victories and five defeats.

The Fairleigh Dickinson squad was obviously tired after being stranded for much of last night when its bus broke down en route from the Madison, N. J. campus. The team had a 9-3-1 season record and had been

## CG Soccer Team Wins By 11-2

MEDFORD, Mass. — Marty Hoppe scored five goals and contributed an assist as Coast Guard Academy's soccer team won its way into the final of the NCAA Middle Atlantic Regional tournament here this morning by trouncing Fairleigh-Dickinson, 11-2.

The Cadets will play the winner of the Norwich University-Washington & Lee game at 1 p.m. tomorrow. The Norwich-Washington & Lee game was scheduled for this afternoon.

Fairleigh-Dickinson led briefly in the first period when it got the first goal, but before the period was over the Cadets had squared things on the first of Hoppe's goals.

Coast Guard sewed up the game with five goals in the second period to take a 6-1 lead. The Cadets built up a 10-1 advantage before the opposition scored again.

Hoppe's five goals enabled him to break his scoring record of a year ago when he had 17 goals in 13 games. He now has 19 in 11 games with at least one more to go.

Other Cadet scorers were Curt Knight, two; Drew Hamblin, two, and Gerry McGill and Don Freeman, one each.

Co-Capt. Bob Walker, Howie Hoppe, Knight, Gene Bowen and John Shkor furnished the defense for the Cadets, who now are 6-5 for the campaign.

# SOCCER GAINS FAME

Soccer stole the fall sports spotlight for the first time ever from its usually successful relative, football, by collecting a winning season from some of the toughest competition in the country, and then capturing the NCAA Atlantic Coast College Division championship at Tufts University. The team wound up with a 7-5 record and the Eastern Cup, symbolic of East Coast supremacy.

The football Bears started cautiously, but lost four straight games before defeating Central Connecticut in the last outing, and mustered only a 3-5 won-loss record. The team was smitten with hard luck throughout the season, and they were trying to match the feat the undefeated 1963 squad, who created a lot of frustration for its New England opponents. Every team the Cadets faced was out for some kind of vengeance, and battling with keyed-up elevens each week was too much of a disadvantage.

Coach Lynwood Bechtel's booters had only a .500 season going into the tournament, but on the strength of a 2-1 overtime upset of UConn, and 4-2 and 4-1 losses to Trinity and Westchester State, respectively, two of the top teams in the nation, they gained entrance. Although the Bears had the weakest record of any of the teams in the tourney, their schedule had been tougher, with four teams that they had faced playing in post-season affairs.

The Cadets swamped highly regard-

Gerry McGill were named to the All-Star team for their outstanding tournament play, an indication of their season's performance. All this was quite a record for the team that was the at-large selection.

Hoppe broke his year-old record of 17 goals in 13 games by netting 19 goals in only 12 contests, and left future teams with an enviable record to shoot for in the coming years.



This morning, the Academy tackled Fairleigh Dickenson College of Teaneck, N.J., in the first round of the NCAA Middle Atlantic Regional Soccer Tournament at Tufts University. Slated for the afternoon go-round are Norwich University and Washington & Lee of Lexington, Va.

In the single elimination event, the losers of today's contests will meet tomorrow morning with the winners battling for the title in the afternoon. Thus far, the NCAA has not revealed further plans for the winner of the Mid-Atlantic Regionals.

# CGA Soccer Team

## Drew Hamblin's Goal In 4th Period Decides

Coast Guard Academy's soccer team today had the championship of the NCAA Atlantic College Division tournament and its second winning season in a row.

The Cadets won the title Saturday by defeating Washington and Lee University, 1-0, in the championship final at Tufts University in Medford, Mass.

The victory brought the Cadets record for the year to 7-5. A year ago, the Cadets were 7-6. These two seasons, incidentally, are the only winning ones in the history of the sport at the academy, going back to 1939.

Drew Hamblin's goal at the four minute mark of the final period brought victory to the Cadets Saturday afternoon.

Coast Guard, last of the four teams to be selected for the tourney, emerged as the class of the event.

On Friday, the Cadets belted Fairleigh-Dickinson, 11-2, and set a new team scoring record in the competition in so doing. The previous record was eight, set a year ago by Lynchburg College of Lynchburg, Va.

### Keep Pressure on Goalie

Saturday the Cadets dominated action against Washington and Lee from start to finish and kept the pressure on the Generals throughout. Goalie Bob Larus had 19 saves until Hamblin cracked his service with the all-important goal.

Hamblin headed the ball into the net after a shot by Marty Hoppe had been blocked by goalie Larus and batted into the field of play. Hamblin put his head into the ball and drove the ball past Larus.

Although the Cadet defense got short shifted in the all-tournament voting, Coach Linwood G. Bechtel today paid tribute to the work of the Cadet secondary. "The defense, headed by Co-Capt. Bob Walker, turned in a tremendous job, but didn't get recognition because our offense put so much pressure on the opposition, our own defense was overlooked," Bechtel said.

The Cadets, however, did put three men on the all-tournament team, headed by Co-Capt. Marty Hoppe at center forward. Gerry McGill was named as outside left and Gene Bowen was picked as right halfback.

On top of this, Marty Hoppe

wound up as the tournament's most valuable player, an honor he clinched in Friday's 11-2 win over Fairleigh-Dickinson. In this game, Hoppe had five goals and two assists.

### Hoppe Marked Man

Saturday, Hoppe was a marked man, but he played another fine game, feeding off to his forwards. And it was his shot at the goal that set up the lone score of the contest.

Hamblin, a sophomore, hadn't done much scoring this season until the tourney, but he had two goals in Friday's game and the winning goal against the Generals.

For the Cadets, the season is over. Now Bechtel and Hoppe can concentrate on basketball, the former as head coach and the latter in his bid for a first string position.

Looking back over the season, Bechtel said the team seemed to jell with the moving of McGill from inside left to outside left. The shift was made in an effort to get more scoring punch to the outside and free the mid die for Hoppe.

McGill not only adapted well to the outside position, but continued as a goal-scoring threat. He had four in one game and wound up with ten for the season.

Hoppe, of course, bettered his academy record of a year ago by two in one less game. He had 19 this season in 12 games, as compared to 17 in 13 a year ago.

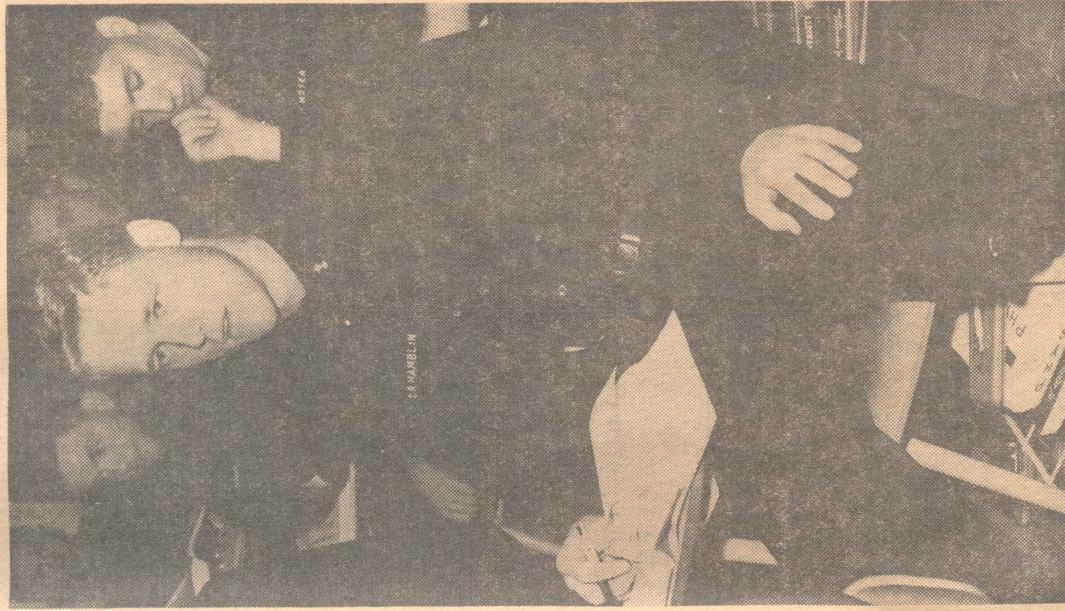

Hoppe's five goals gave him a new academy scoring record

for a single season. He now has 19 in 11 games, two more than he scored a year ago in 13. There's at least today's game left and maybe more if the Cadets come through with a win.

### Busloads at Game

The Cadets figured to have lots of moral and vocal support for their championship contest. Two busloads of Cadets left the academy early this morning to be on hand for the afternoon contest.

The championship game pits a team with a punch against a team with a defense. Coast Guard, while not exactly poor on defense, nevertheless is an exponent of the theory that a strong offense is the best defense. The Cadets have won most of their games with a flock of goals. Washington & Lee is primarily a defensive unit.

Hoppe is the team's big scorer, but there are other Cadet threats. McGill, for instance, scored four goals in one game against Clark earlier in the season and has been a consistent scorer all season from his outside left position.

Coast Guard has played a schedule that should fit it for the tourney finale. The Cadets have lost five games this season and four of their conquerors wound up in post-season competition.

Drew Hamblin used his head to score the only goal of the final round 1-0 win over Washington and Lee University.

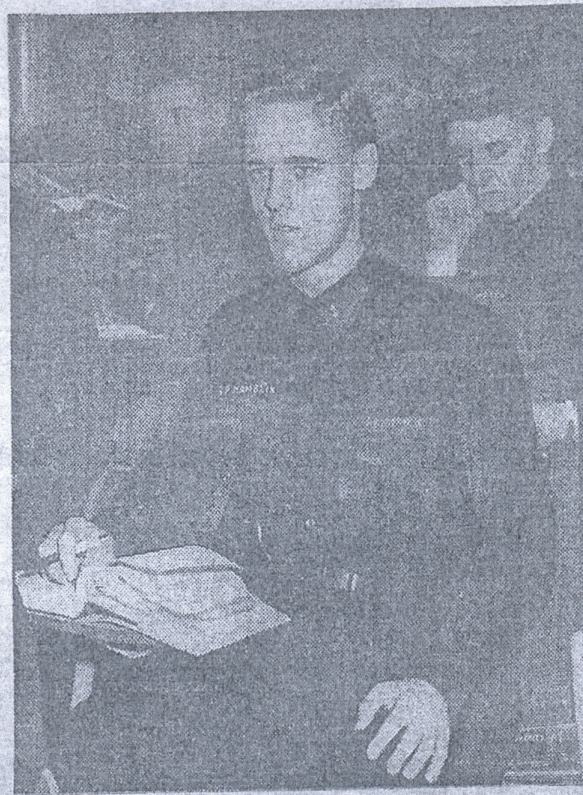

## BOOTERS WIN EASTERN NCAA CUP

Coach Lynwood "Gerry" Bechtel has said all along that his charges had the potential to "go all the way" this year, but it took the pressure of a post-season tourney to prove his predictions. The Cadets came home from Tufts University with the NCAA Atlantic Coast College Division tournament championship by swamping highly rated Farleigh Dickenson of Teaneck, N.J., 11-2, and edging powerful Washington & Lee 1-0 in the finale.

**The tourney gave the Cadets a 7-5 record for their second consecutive winning season (both under Bechtel) and only the second victorious season in Academy history.**

The Cadets gained entrance into the tourney on the strength of a 2-1 overtime upset over UCONN and a 4-2 overtime loss to Trinity, rated No. 1 in the New England large-school tourney. Although the booters entered the tourney with the weakest record, they had played the toughest schedule, with four teams that bested the Cadets seeing post season action in tourneys. The Cadets had ended the season with a 4-1 loss to Westchester State, rated in the top 10 nationally.

**It was Drew Hamblin's goal with four minutes in the game that capped a season of hard work and high aspirations for the Academy booters. The sophomore inside headed a rebounded shot by Hoppe to wrap up a tight defensive battle.**

The Cadets dominated all the action in the tourney, breaking a one-game scoring record with 11 goals against Farleigh Dickinson. Five goals by Co-captain Marty Hoppe in that contest gave him the award for the tourney's most valuable player. The lanky forward also eclipsed his own record of 17 goals in 13 games last season with 19 in 12 contests this year.

**Two busloads of Cadets were on hand for the tourney final, a thrilling battle between the two strong clubs. The Cadets, usually a strong defensive team, continually pressured the W & L defense, with the opposing goalie accredited with 17 saves. Hoppe, double-teamed by the opposition and covered at all times, came up with some fine team play to lead the Coast Guard offense.**

Although the defense had little opportunity to show its strength, Gene Bowen represented the Cadet backfield on the All-Star team. Hoppe and McGill made the first team for their offensive play. Don Freeman saved his best performance of the year for the games as the crafty sophomore continually stood out for outstanding showing.
